Narragansett Bay Quilter's Association GENERAL MEETING April 20, 2011

President: Melanie Johnston called the meeting to order at 7:02 PM. She invited members to take instructions for constructing school tote bags for the United Methodist Church's outreach program. **Comfort Quilts:** Donna Woodworth reported that 5 quilts had been finished for Ronald McDonald House and gave out 8 tops to be quilted.

NEQM: Ginny Perry announced that mothers will receive free admission to the museum on Mother's Day. On May 7 there will be a tea at the museum at 2 PM with a Mary Todd Lincoln impersonator. Admission is \$15 for members and \$20 for all others.

Membership: Renewal forms are on the website and will be in the newsletter, and **must** be returned by the end of May. If not returned in time, your spot will be given to someone on the waiting list.

Special Events: Louise Pankiewicz said there were still plenty of openings for the bus trip to the Rising Star Quilters Show in Somers NY on April 30. She may add a pickup in Westerly if there is interest. She also reminded members about the Quilt Shop Hop till April 30th.

Quilt Show: Joan Halley displayed the fabric for the fat quarter challenge. Quilts will be due by the February 2012 meeting, and will be displayed in a special exhibit at the show.

Hospitality: Dotty Calvano announced a strawberry social for the May meeting and asked for assistance preparing the berries and biscuits.

Program: Mickey Lawler gave a humorous slide and trunk show of her 40 year quilting career. Her website is <u>.skydyes.com</u>. People who took photos of her quilts were cautioned not to use them anywhere, including blogs, websites, email, etc. as she retains all rights to the images of her work.

President: Melanie announced a proposed change to the bylaws regarding composition of the Executive Board. Historian, Librarian, Publicity and Webmaster were going to be categorized as Key Contributors, while Special Events and Comfort quilts would be added to the list of Standing Committees. The change reflects the relative importance of these different roles to the mission of the NBQA. The exact wording will be posted on the website and in this newsletter, and will be voted on at the May meeting. Melanie also announced the new nominating committee for next year's officers and committees: Peggy Lane, Diana Funke and Joan Johnson. Anyone wishing to volunteer for a position should contact them. NBQA has received an inquiry from someone to commission a twin bed quilt. Contact Melanie for more information if interested. There will be no magazine swap in May due to the need for tables for the Silent Auction.

Treasurer: Beginning balance \$17,651.10 in the General Fund, \$8000 for the Quilt Show; General Fund Income \$1,850.00; General Fund Expenses \$6,087.91; General Fund ending balance \$13,413.19. The balance in the Quilt Show account will remain level in non-show years. An ending balance of \$8000 will be maintained in the General Fund to ensure operation of the group's activities. Melanie announced some upcoming capital expenditures for quilt hanging equipment, a speaker system and a projector. **Workshops:** Next one is Pat Livingston's Hawaiian Appliqué.

Fat Quarters: 38 were awarded. Next month's fabric is florals. The special spring cleaning fat quarter swap was held during the break.

Block of the Month: Four Twisted Square blocked were won. Next month's block is a Butterfly applique.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:54 PM.

ARTICLE VII STANDING COMMITTEES AND DUTIES

To: Section 1: The standing committees of the Corporation shall be as follows: Comfort Quilts; Hospitality; Membership; New England Quilt Museum Representative; Newsletter; Program; Quilt Show; and Special Events.

Move Sections 2, Historian, Section 4, Librarian, and to Article VIII Section 8, Publicity, to (NEW) Article VIII

Add new section: The Comfort Quilts Chairperson shall coordinate at least one charity quilt making event per year and serve as liaison for charity quilt distribution.

Add new section: The Special Events Chairperson shall plan and coordinate any special trips, shop hops etc.

Renumber all sections sequentially, Section 1 to Section 9.

ADD: ARTICLE VIII KEY CONTRIBUTOR DUTIES

Section 1: Key Contributors perform specific functions for the corporation. Their duties may be intermittent.

Reword From: Section 2: The Historian will compile and maintain the club scrapbook, recording the history of the club through pictures, programs, etc.

To: Section 2: The Historian will record the history of the club through pictures, programs, audio, video media etc.

Section 3: Reword From: The Librarian shall maintain the library and purchase books, subscriptions and other media as suggested by the Executive Board and membership, and will supervise circulation and make contents readily available to members at monthly meetings.

To: The Librarian shall serve as the liaison to the NBQA Collection at the Cranston Public Library; may add to that collection as suggested by the Executive Board and membership; may purchase DVDs and other media, making contents readily available to members at monthly meetings.

Section 4: The Publicity chairperson shall prepare and distribute press releases for newsworthy events and shall disseminate quilt related information received from other sources.

Add Section 5: The Webmaster shall be responsible for posting information on the NQBA website and serving as liaison to the website designer and/or technician.

Classroom...... Pat Bruno

Tips from Pat Bruno: a Follow-up to her February, 2011 workshop.

Free motion decorative quilting can be as much fun as coloring with crayons when we were kids, but it can be very stressful and physically painful if the set-up you use is uncomfortable. There are some adaptations that quilters can make that can help relieve some of the stress of close machine stitch work and the strain it can place on the eyes, shoulders and back after a length of time. For those who attended the February workshop and those who didn't, here are a few of my secrets and the specific products that I have found to work for me. They are not meant as endorsements; they are just what I have settled on through trial and error.

- I use **quilt "halos**," two at a time, by Sharon Schamber. They are one pound rubberized rings that sit on the surface of the quilt. They are not attached to the quilt in any way. Moving the rings easily moves the quilt sandwich beneath the rings, and they can be repositioned quickly and easily as the area you are quilting changes. The weight of two rings on top of each other makes it extremely easy to move even a bed-sized quilt when using a domestic machine to machine quilt. A **Teflon slider** below the quilt sandwich provides an easy glide. For free motion work you want your movement to be as free as possible with no hitches in the movement. This set-up is great. The "halos" are available on Sharon Schamber's web site and on Pat Ferguson's web site (an NBQA member).
- I bought a **Craftlite "Ultra Magnifier Light**" NO. CL411 at the Houston show in November at Sharon Schamber's booth. It was the last one she had and I don't know if she has them on her web site or not. It is worth it to check. This is a lighted, approximately 7" diameter, magnifying lens on a long adjustable arm that clamps to your sewing table. It can be adjusted to a comfortable distance between you and your needle allowing you to sit up straight and not hunch over when you are doing tiny machine quilting. It relieves *lots* of the stress in your back and shoulders and, of course, it really helps tired eyes see better. You can also use it for hand work. Try "Googling" a source. (This is how Sharon is able to quilt with 100 wt. silk thread!)
- I use **pre-wound bobbins** filled with a sixty-weight polyester thread made by Fil-Tec. The company is out of Cavetown, MD. Each bobbin has a magnetic core which prevents the bobbin from flopping around inside the bobbin case. I buy them by the box (100 per). The bobbins come in two sizes depending on the machine you have. (This from a person who never thought I would use a pre-wound bobbin.) They eliminate any trouble with gnarly winding of 60 wt. thread onto your bobbins, which some people experience (including myself). I thread my bobbin thread through the eye in the neck of the bobbin case to prevent the bobbin thread from flopping down into the case.
- My **sewing machine is recessed into a cabinet** so that it sits flush with the surface of the table. *I think this is crucial*. If you don't have a cabinet, buy an old table and have someone cut a hole to fit your machine and build a shelf so that your machine will sit flush with the table top. I have a **card table** directly behind my cabinet so that the quilt has a surface to rest on as it passes through the machine. I place an **ironing board** at my right elbow drawn up to my cabinet and at the same height as the surface of my cabinet so that I have another surface to rest the quilt on. My goal is to have all parts of the quilt sandwich supported on a surface. No part can hang over an edge as this drags the whole sandwich down and makes it hard (that is, nearly impossible) to move the quilt freely. When **free motion quilting** even movement and even motor speed will result in even stitches.
 - Always make sure your machine is running before you move your hands!
- To make the **baby piping** I use inside the binding on many of my quilts, I use nylon twine from Staples and a Bernina #23 appliqué foot. I use straight of grain to make piping for a

straight binding application and bias grain for curved applications. I trim my piping to a 1/4 " seam allowance using an "Add a Quarter" ruler.

I hope these hints fill in some of the specifics to questions I have been asked about products that I use myself. There are loads of other tools and materials available for quilters that are probably every bit as useful as the ones that I have mentioned. All I can tell you is that I have tried just about every combination of cording, gloves, rulers, and special feet...you name it. These things all work for me and have made my life easier. I hope this helps you out. **Happy quilting.**

Mission Moments: Put Your Hands Around the World

Bag project for the East Greenwich United Methodist Church.

Hands-On Mission Project: School Kits for UMCOR

Make the Bag

Use heavy-duty fabric (not lightweight).

1. Cut two pieces of cloth 15 by 19 inches, allowing 1/2 inch for seams on sides and bottom and a 2 1/2-inch hem at the top. This will give the required finished size of 14 by 16 inches.

2. Place the two 15- by 19-inch pieces of cloth together, right sides together, and sew a 1/2-inch seam down one side, across the bottom, and up the other side, leaving the top open.

3. Turn the bag so the seam is inside the bag.

4. Turn under 1/2 inch of top edge and stitch.

5. Turn under 2 inches at the top to form a hem and stitch.

Make the Handles

1. For the handles, cut two 4- by 23-inch strips.

2. Fold in half the length of one of the 4-inch by 23-inch strips with right sides together.

Stitch with a 1/2-inch seam allowance, and turn the seam to the inside.

3. Repeat with the second strip of cloth.

4. Place one handle at the top of the bag, turning under the 1/2-inch raw edge of the material and securing by stitching. Repeat with the other strip of cloth, making the handle on the opposite side of the bag.

Optional Closure

Closures are optional and can be done with buttons, snaps, or hook and loop fasteners. When using hook and loop fasteners, stitch small pieces of the fasteners near the top center inside of the bag. Stitch loops on one side and hooks on the other.


